



Bare Root English Rose

Why plant a bare root rose? Those unfamiliar with bare root roses can be taken aback by what looks like a clump of sticks and roots. In fact, that's exactly what dormant roses look like. Planting bare root roses is all about root growth, say the rose experts at David Austin Roses. Once planted, in cool soil a dormant rose focuses on root development, as it has no leaves or flowers to support. The result is a vigorous, fully-developed root system that benefits the rose over its lifetime.
