



Plant Three Together

A design tip from David Austin Roses: If space allows, plant three bare root roses of the same variety close together in a triangle to encourage contiguous growth. In this way, one large dense bush is achieved rather than three smaller ones. The effect is lovely in the garden or landscape. When planting, dig a separate hole for each bare root rose. Space the three holes about 18 to 20 inches apart in colder areas, and 24 inches apart in warmer zones. Don't crowd companion plants too close, give the three-rose cluster sufficient space to grow and knit together.
